Seven acres given to Land Trust

The Five Town Land Trust has announced that Richard and Joyce Joy of Ellington have donated seven acres of land in Ellington.

The land, at Lanz Lane and Deborah Road, is valued at \$310,000, and paid taxes of \$4,800 a year.

George Grant, secretary of the trust, said the trust has not yet decided how it will use the land.

The trust is a nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving undeveloped land in a natural state in Enfield, Ellington, East Windsor, Somers and Stafford.
