

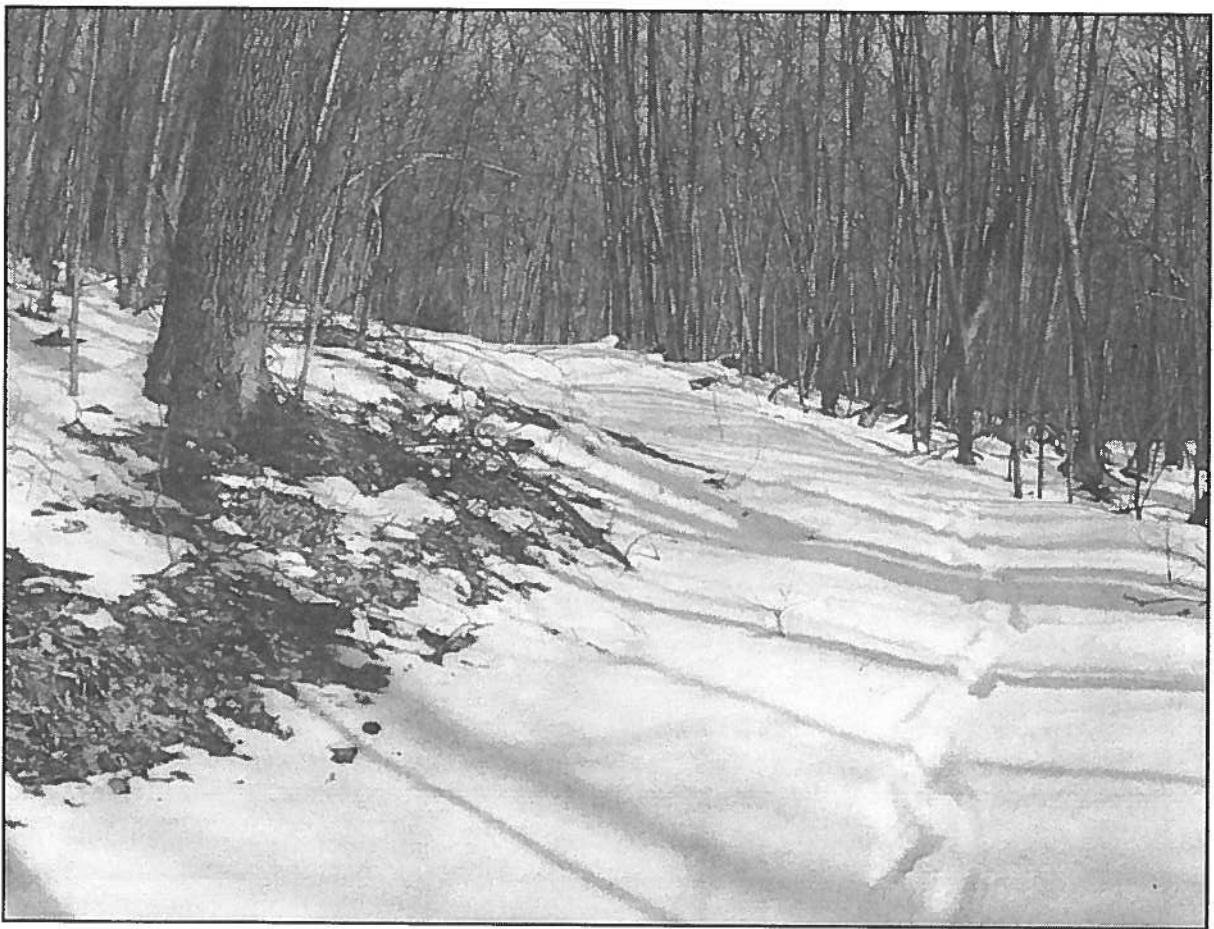

Our Directors are elected to staggered three year terms by the members at an annual meeting which takes place each year in september. We are annual volunteer organization and have no paid staff: therefor our members and friends are the backbone of our Land Trust.





PRESIDENT'S LETTER

To our Members and Friends:

The past year has proven to be the most productive in the history of your Land Trust. In early February, NCLT and the town of Somers jointly purchased the 266 acre Whitaker Woods in Somers for \$1,200,000. This exciting acquisition was made possible through the cooperation of the town of Somers, the State of Connecticut, eight foundations and wide-spread public support. Comprised of mixed forest, with some grass lands, the Woods hosts both Shady Brook and Gulf Stream within its boundaries. Beneath its surface lies an important aquifer, which provides a substantial amount of Somer's water supply. It also borders NCLT's McCann Family Farm, as well as state forest lands. It goes without saying that an acquisition of this scope would have been impossible without the unflinching support of our constituency, both public and private.

Early this spring, NCLT installed research plantings of American chestnuts on two Trust properties. Should soil conditions warrant, we expect that full scale plantings will occur next spring, furthering research needed by the American Chestnut Foundation, in its effort to re-establish the native chestnut forest. Early testings are favorable, and we look forward to participating further in this timely program.

The Land Trust suffered a severe loss this year with the passing of Ernie Boothroyd. One of the founding members of the Trust, Ernie possessed a keen eye and ear, and a strong sense of history. His dogged pursuit of documents, old deeds and wills kept town clerks in the area on their toes. A native son of Ellington, Ernie knew precisely the vagaries of any boundary on NCLT land and therefore was entrusted with the marking of our various holding. He kept us out of trouble. He was a good friend and is greatly missed.

Edgar and Fay Dresner have stepped back from their various responsibilities with the Trust, and we thank them for their loyal support. Fay labored long as our Membership Chair, and Edgar routinely hiked our lands both as a monitor, Director, and hike leader.

As our land holdings have grown, so have our stewardship responsibilities. Director Jerry Stage oversees a vast pool of hard working volunteers, some 125 in number. With the addition of Whitaker Woods to our holdings, Jerry's Volunteers have an entirely new set of challenges ahead. Work has already begun on clearing trails and opening grass lands. Shady Brook and Gulf Stream, which bi-sect the tract, need tender, loving care after last spring's floodings. Work parties sally forth in all twelve months. A welcome relief from office and kitchen.

This has been a tumultuous year. But a good tumultuous year, sparked by good deeds and good people. I am in the debt of those who gave so willingly of their funds to advance our cause. To our attorneys, Bob Peters and Amy Paterson, I applaud your patience. And to our Board and membership, I am indebted for your support.

ABOUT WHITAKER WOODS

A wise man once said, "The possible takes some time, the impossible a little longer." Such was the case in NCLT's acquisition of the 266 acre Whitaker Woods tract. From early negotiations with the Whitaker family's trustee in Nashville Tennessee, to closing ceremonies, stretched out over some 36 months. The process has been likened to "rolling a very large rock up a very steep hill", with some accuracy. A coalition of the town of Somers, the State of Connecticut, seven foundations and the general public proved to be the winning formula, and on February 12, 2006, the land transfer was consummated.

The Whitaker property, situated squarely in the center of Somers, consists of mixed forest and some agricultural land, used as pasture. Beneath the site is an aquifer which services, not only Somers, but the Connecticut Water Company, which maintains several wells on the perimeter of the property. An old springhouse, guarding a productive water source, has fallen into disrepair and will be re-built. A steep hill, near the center of the Woods, was once used as a ski hill. NCLT is looking into the possibility of converting the slope into a "sledding" hill, open to all during the snowy, winter months. Perhaps one of the most striking assets of the Woods, is its stunning network of stone walls. Of unusual height, these walls interlace the property, hinting at the former use of the land as pasture

and hay fields. Hiking trails are clearly defined, and in most cases, relatively open. Plans are afoot to connect the trail network to those approaching from Soapstone Mountain. A management plan for the land will be written, but only after 12 months have elapsed, as NCLT wishes to experience and understand the Woods during all four seasons. A good example of that rationale is the opportunity to observe fluctuating levels of the two streams which bi-sect the property, Gulf Stream and Shady Brook over 12 months' time.

Over the years, Whitaker Woods will provide wonderful opportunities for the public to enjoy the wonders of Mother Nature. It is our hope that visitors will treat the preserve as an extension of their own property, with the respect and care which it deserves. Enjoy.



RESTORATION OF THE AMERICAN CHESTNUT FOREST

The American chestnut tree was once the predominate species in the Appalachian Mountain area, with a range from Georgia to Maine, including most of Connecticut.

They were magnificent trees, growing to a height of 100 feet. Because they grew rapidly and provided rot-resistant wood, they were a valuable source of lumber. As they produced large quantities of nuts annually, they were an important part of the food supply for deer, turkey, other small animals and humans. However, in 1904, an imported, lethal fungus, accidentally introduced to the forest ecology, drastically altered woodland conditions. By the 1940's, virtually all large chestnut stock was dead. Although some roots remained alive and produced small sprouts, the blight killed the sprouts before they could mature. A once superb species was wiped out, doing untold harm not only to wildlife, but also to the lumber economy.

In 1983, a group of prominent scientists established The American Chestnut Foundation (TCAF) in an attempt to restore the chestnut to its native woodlands. By cross-breeding American chestnuts with fungus-resistant Asian chestnuts, TCAF has developed trees with the characteristics of the American chestnut, and the blight resistance of their Asian cousins. In an effort to lend a helping hand, NCLT has formed an alliance with TCAF, and has volunteered land for research purposes. Experimental plantings have been made at the Swann Farm in Ellington, and Whitaker Woods in Somers. This past July, several mature, native American chestnuts were discovered locally.

These trees have been pollinated with blight resistant pollen, from TCAF research farms in Virginia. The pollination was successfully completed by the Bartlett Tree Experts who generously donated equipment and manpower. Any nuts that result from the pollination will be harvested and planted on our NCLT sites. A first step in restoring the American chestnut to its rightful place in our woodlands.

Although it will be years before the benefits of our alliance can be evaluated, the opportunity to provide a substantial gift to future generations is welcomed by NCLT. For after all, isn't that what land trusts are all about?

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT- FISCAL YEAR 2006

The past fiscal year that ended on July 31, 2006 was devoted to the acquisition of Whitaker Woods. We were able to fund the purchase of this \$1,200,000 property through a variety of strategies. The Town of Somers made this purchase possible by agreeing to provide \$600,000. The NCLT received generous grants from the DEP and from eight foundations and charitable trusts. An appeal to our members, volunteers, friends, and local businesses resulted in gifts from an additional 94 contributors. We sincerely thank all who made this project a success.

The closing on the property was made possible by a \$225,000 loan from the Town of Somers and we currently jointly own the property with the Town. The loan will be repaid when we receive the promised grant from the DEP. At that time, total ownership will be transferred to the Land Trust. We also received an interest free, one year loan from The Norcross Wildlife Foundation to help fund the closing. We have paid back part of this loan and are in negotiations to sell 2 ½ acres to an abutting neighbor that will allow us to pay off the remainder. We plan to have all loans paid back by December of this year.

Fiscal Year 2006 financial statements are included in this report. One unusual item is the \$5,092 expense for training. The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving provided a grant for the cost of training our Board of Directors in fundraising techniques. We attended an excellent series of seminars conducted by a fund raising consultant thanks to the generosity of the Hartford Foundation.

Thanks to the efforts of our Board and the generosity of the community, we have had a very successful year.

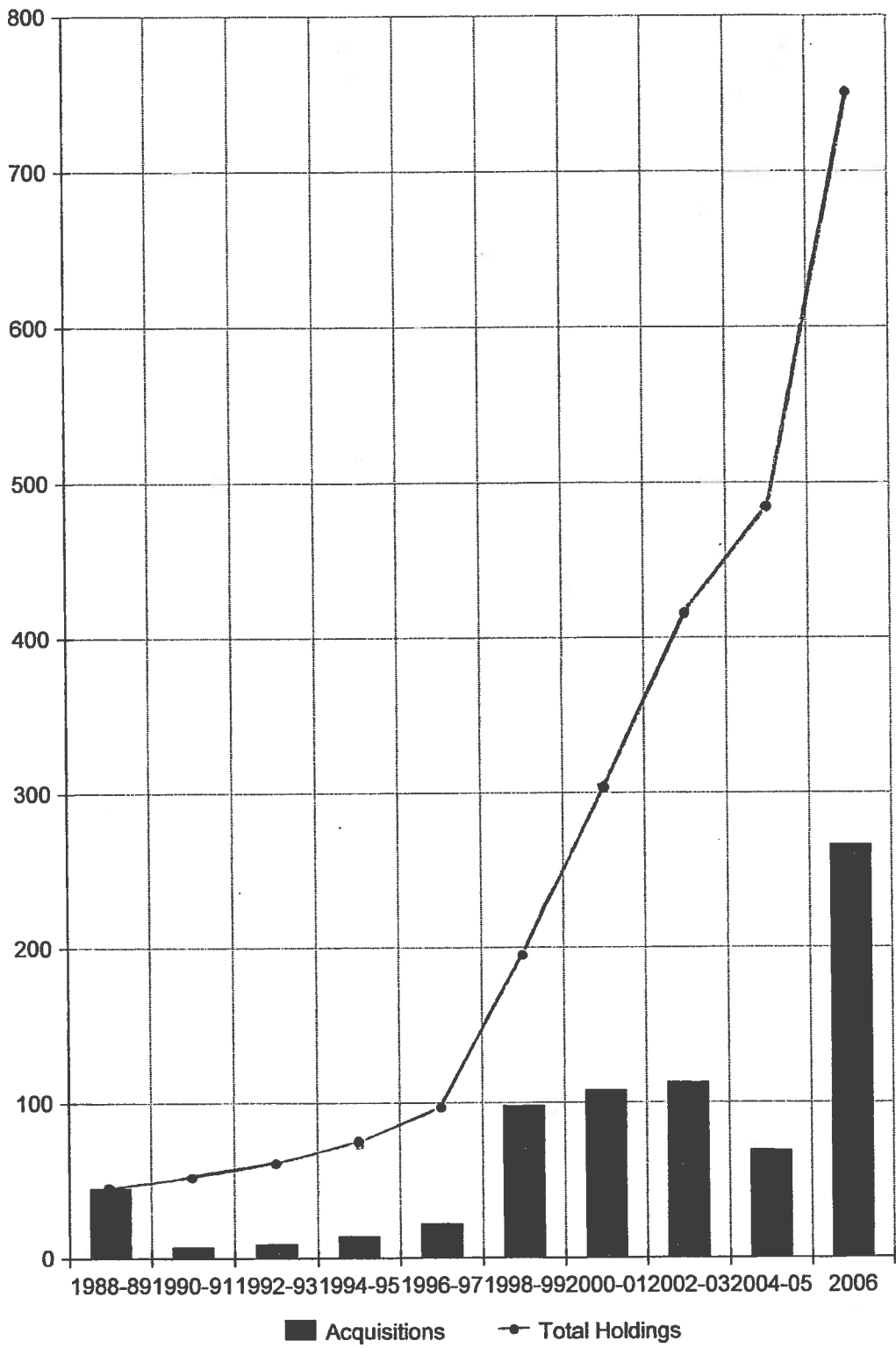

LAND STEWARDSHIP REPORT

This has been one of the best- ever years for the Land Stewardship Committee (LSC). Record-breaking field work by members of the LSC and volunteers was stimulated by two significant events. The most exciting was the fulfillment of a cherished dream, the acquisition of the beautiful and strategically significant Whitaker Woods parcel. The other, also exciting, was the torrential rain and flooding of last October, which washed out our main bridges over Gulf Stream on McCann's Family Farm. Also lost were the bog bridges in the Scantic Riparian area and McCann's. Much of Gulf Road was washed into the Whitaker property as well. Addressing these tasks, along with our normal routine maintenance, litter collection and the like, we scheduled 17 work parties with more than 57 volunteers participating. Additionally, seventeen volunteers took part in ad hoc field work, which included 129 additional property monitoring. As of this writing (September 4), 1185 volunteer work hours have been recorded, a substantial 56% increase more than last year.

While we are grateful to all those who pitched in, we would like to acknowledge the following volunteers who gave us extraordinary hours of their time, and their unfailing high spirits: Jim Gage, George and Leslie Grant, Arend Knuttel, Paul Lagel, Gayle Manning, Bruce Marvonek, Ginny Patsun, Hector Pope, Bob Schoff, Wes Smith, Mike Vozzolo and John Wraight.. Each spent a minimum of 25 hours in the field, seven recorded more than 50 hours, three hearties logged more than 75 hours and one stalwart tallied 204 hours!

Chair: Karl Hasel


